Requisites for Admission.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class are examined in the following studies :

1. English Grammar, Geography, and Willson's Outlines of History.
2. Arithmetic, and Algebra through Quadratic Equations.
3. *Viri Romae*, two books of Cæsar's Com., four books of Virgil's *Æneid*, Sallust, Cicero's Select Orations, and twelve Chapters of Arnold's Prose Composition.
4. Crosby's Greek Grammar, and three Books of Xenophon's *Anabasis*, entire.

Candidates for the Scientific Course, are examined in all the studies named above, excepting the Latin and Greek Languages.

Candidates for an advanced standing are examined in the preparatory studies, and in all those that have been pursued by the class they wish to enter, or in studies that may be deemed equivalent. It is very important that candidates should be thoroughly prepared in the requisites for admission, especially in grammatical and elementary knowledge. If they have more time than is required for such a preparation, it is desired, for obvious reasons, that they should not anticipate the books read in College, but direct their attention to other authors.

The regular examination for admission to College, takes place on the Monday immediately preceding COMMENCEMENT, and the Wednesday before the beginning of the Fall Term. Students will, however, be examined at such other times as may be appointed, when application shall be made. Satisfactory testimonials of a good moral character will in all cases be required, and Students coming from other Colleges, must present certificates of regular dismission.

No Student can be received for less than one entire Term; and no one is permitted to enter the Senior Class later than the beginning of the third Term.

Lectures.

In the department of Chemistry and Natural History, a course of lectures will be delivered each term. The first, on Chemistry; the second, on Electricity, Magnetism, and Electro Chemistry; and the third, on Natural History. For the two former, an extra charge will be made of one dollar per term; all other lectures in the Institution, are free of charge to the students.

In the department of Mathematics, lectures will be delivered on Optics. The Telescope and other instruments will be used in connection with the study of Astronomy, and field exercises will be had in Surveying.

The Professor of Ancient Languages will occasionally give familiar lectures upon the Antiquities, History, and Literature of the Greeks and Romans.

The Professor of Modern Languages will give familiar lectures on French and German Literature, in connection with the authors read.

In the department of Intellectual and Moral Philosophy, instruction is given in a free and conversational manner, interspersed with frequent brief lectures by the President.

THEOLOGICAL STUDIES.

Special accommodation, over and above the College Course, will be made for young men having the Ministry in view. Classes in Hebrew, Biblical Theology, Homiletics, Ecclesiastical History, and Church Discipline will be taught, whenever a sufficient number of applications shall be made.

DECLAMATIONS AND WRITTEN EXERCISES.

Declamations and Compositions, alternately, are required every week. Written Exercises in Latin and Greek are required of the Freshman and Sophomore classes.

EXAMINATIONS.

At the close of every Term, each class is examined in the studies of the Term by a Committee appointed for that purpose. Students claiming to have pursued any part or parts of our course of study, independent of our instructions, are required to be examined on said studies, *in the presence of the Faculty.*

PUBLIC WORSHIP.

Prayers, with the reading of the Scriptures, are attended daily in the College Chapel. All students are also required to attend Public Worship on the Sabbath; in the morning at one of the churches in the village, and in the afternoon in the College Chapel.

MERIT ROLL.

An account of the daily attendance, scholarship, conduct and delinquencies of every student is kept. The result, determining his place on the Merit Roll, is entered at the close of each Term on the records of the College. A report of the standing and demeanor of students, will be sent to Parents and Guardians when requested.

DEGREES.

The Degree of Bachelor of Arts is conferred on all students who have completed the College Course, and sustained a satisfactory examination on every part thereof.

The Degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred on all students who give satisfactory evidence of the completion of the Scientific Course. No degree will be conferred unless all College dues are secured.

The Degree of Master of Arts is conferred on every Bachelor of Arts, of three years standing, who, in the interval, has sustained a good moral character. Application should be made personally, or by letter, at least two weeks before Commencement.

The fee, including the Diploma, in each case, is five dollars, payable in advance.

DISCIPLINE.

The government is parental, and is designed to secure attention to study and correctness of deportment; not so much by enforcing rigid enactments, as by cultivating in the student a taste for intellectual pursuits. No student who indulges in gaming, intemperance, or other vices, no one who is frequently absent from his room at night, or who habitually neglects his studies, can be allowed to remain a member of the College.

LIBRARY.

The Library is open every Saturday. It is accessible to all students; a small fee is charged for its use.

It is hoped by the aid of scholarships, the use of which has been donated for the benefit of the Library, constantly to increase this important department.

During the year past, the apparatus has received most valuable additions.

CABINET OF NATURAL HISTORY.

There is a very large Cabinet of Natural History connected with the College, procured at an expense of several thousand dollars.

EXPENSES.

Perpetual scholarships, securing free tuition, may be procured for One Hundred Dollars. No scholarship is available until the conditions of the scholarship note are complied with. Certificates of claim, in all cases, must be presented during the first week of each Term.

The charge for tuition to those not having scholarships, is \$8.50 per Term. There is an additional charge of one dollar for each course of Lectures in Chemistry, and for each course in Electricity and Magnetism. A small charge is also made for the use of the Library, and for Incidentals. The price of Board varies from \$2 to \$2.50 per week.

The entire expense of a student, exclusive of Books and Incidentals, need not exceed \$100 per annum.

Twenty scholarships have been placed at the disposal of the Superintendent of Public Instruction of the State. An order from him entitles the holder to all the privileges granted to the proprietors of scholarships.

The President has at his disposal a considerable number of scholarships, the benefit of which various benevolent friends have given to the Library, and which may be obtained at his office for seven dollars per annum.

TERM BILLS.

All College bills are payable at the beginning of the Term, and no student will receive a regular dismission from the College until the bills for the current Term have been settled. Moneys deposited in any solvent Bank of the State, to the credit of the Treasurer, and payable to his order, in payment of subscription notes, or other dues, will be promptly acknowledged on the receipt of the certificate of such deposits.

VACATIONS.

The first, from Commencement—eight weeks. The second, from the close of the Fall Term—three weeks. The third, from the close of the Winter Term—two weeks.
