## Genesee College.

### REQUISITES FOR ADMISSION.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class are examined in the following studies;

1. English Grammar, Geography, and Willson's Outlines of History.
2. Arithmetic, and Algebra through Quadratic Equations.
3. Latin Reader or Eclogæ Cicronianæ in Hanson's Latin Prose Book, two books of Caesar's Com., six books of Virgil's Æneid, Cicero's Select Orations, and twelve Chapters of Arnold's Prose Composition. Hanson's Latin Prose Book is recommended.
4. Hadley's Greek Grammar, and three Books of Xenophon's Anabasis.

Candidates for the Scientific Course are examined in all the studies named above, excepting the Latin and Greek Languages.

Candidates for an advanced standing are examined in the preparatory studies, and in all those that have been pursued by the class they wish to enter, or in studies that may be deemed equivalent. It is very important that candidates should be thoroughly prepared in the requisites for admission, especially in grammatical and elementary knowledge. If they have more time than is required for such a preparation, it is desired, for obvious reasons, that they should not anticipate the books read in College, but direct their attention to other authors.

The regular examinations for admission to College, take place on the Monday immediately preceding COMMENCEMENT, and the Wednesday before the beginning of the Fall Term. Students will, however, be examined at such other times as may be appointed, when application shall be made. Satisfactory testimonials of a good moral character will in all cases be required, and Students coming from other Colleges, must present certificates of regular dismission.

No Student can be received for less than one entire Term; and no one is permitted to enter the Senior Class later than the beginning of the third Term.

### EXPENSES.

Perpetual Scholarships, securing free tuition, may be procured for One Hundred Dollars. No scholarship is available until the conditions

of the scholarship note are complied with. Certificates of claim, in all cases, must be presented during the first week of each Term.

The charge for tuition to those not having scholarships, is \$8,50 per Term. There is an additional charge of one dollar for each course of Lectures in Chemistry, and for each course in Electricity and Magnetism. A charge of three dollars a term is also made for Incidentals, and for the use of the Library. The price of Board varies from \$3 to \$3,50 per week.

Twenty scholarships have been placed at the disposal of the Superintendent of Public Instruction of the State. An order from him entitles the holder to all the privileges granted to the proprietors of scholarships.

The Treasurer has at his disposal a considerable number of scholarships, the benefit of which various benevolent friends have given to the Institution, and which may be obtained at his office for seven dollars per annum, or at that rate per term.

#### TERM BILLS.

All College bills are payable at the beginning of the Term, and no student will receive a regular dismissal from the College until the bills for the current Term have been settled. Monies deposited in any solvent Bank of the State, to the credit of the Treasurer, and payable to his order, in payment of subscription notes, or other dues, will be promptly acknowledged on the receipt of certificate of such deposits.

#### DISCIPLINE.

The government is parental, and is designed to secure attention to study and correctness of deportment; not so much by enforcing rigid enactments, as by cultivating in the student a taste for intellectual pursuits. No student who indulges in gaming, intemperance, or other vices, no one who is frequently absent from his room at night, or who habitually neglects his studies, can be allowed to remain a member of the College.

#### PUBLIC WORSHIP.

Prayers, with the reading of the Scriptures, are attended daily in the College Chapel. All students are also required to attend Public Worship on the Sabbath; in the morning at one of the churches in the village, and in the afternoon in the College Chapel.

#### LECTURES.

In the department of Intellectual and Moral Philosophy, instruction is given in a free and conversational manner, interspersed with frequent brief lectures.

In the department of Mathematics, lectures will be delivered on Optics. The Telescope and other instruments will be used in connection with the study of Astronomy, and the Class in Surveying will have exercises in the field.

The Professor of Modern Languages will give familiar lectures on French and German Literature, in connection with the authors read.

The Professor of Natural Sciences will deliver a course of lectures extending through the first and second terms of the year upon Chemistry, Statical and Dynamical Electricity, Magnetism and Electro-Magnetism, illustrated by numerous experiments. To defray the expense of these experiments a charge of one dollar per term will be made to each student of the class.

The Professor of Ancient Languages will occasionally give familiar lectures upon the Antiquities, History, and Literature of the Greeks and Romans.

#### DECLAMATIONS AND WRITTEN EXERCISES.

Declamations and Compositions, alternately, every week, and written exercises in Latin and Greek are required of the Freshman and Sophomore classes.

#### THEOLOGICAL STUDIES.

Special accommodation, over and above the College Course, will be made for young men having the Ministry in view. Classes in Hebrew, Biblical Theology, Homiletics, Ecclesiastical History, and Church Discipline will be taught privately, by the President, whenever a sufficient number of applications shall be made.

#### MERIT ROLL.

An account of the daily attendance, scholarship, conduct and delinquencies of every student is kept. The result, determining his place on the Merit Roll, is entered at the close of each Term on the records of the College. A report of the standing and demeanor of students, will be sent to Parents and Guardians when requested.

#### EXAMINATIONS.

At the close of every Term, each class is examined in the studies of the Term by a Committee appointed for that purpose. Students claiming to have pursued any part or parts of our course of study, independent of our instructions, are required to be examined on said studies, *in the presence of the Faculty*, and for every such private examination a fee of one dollar in advance will be charged, the fund so raised to be appropriated to the improvement of the Library and Apparatus.

## DEGREES.

The Degree of Bachelor of Arts is conferred on all students who have completed the College Course, and sustained a satisfactory examination on every part thereof.

The Degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred on all students who give satisfactory evidence of the completion of the Scientific Course. No degree will be conferred unless all College dues are secured.

The Degree of Master of Arts is conferred on every Bachelor of Arts of three years standing, who, in the interval, has sustained a good moral character. Application should be made personally, or by letter, at least two weeks before commencement.

The fee, including the Diploma, in each case, is five dollars, payable in advance.

## PRIZES.

The President's prize is annually awarded to that gentleman of the Freshman class, who in the judgment of the examining committee and conference visitors present, shall excel in Declamation.

This prize was last year awarded to JOHN DEMPSTER HAMMOND. Liberal friends it is hoped, will soon create other like foundations.

## LIBRARIES.

The Libraries of the College and the two literary societies contain an aggregate of about five thousand volumes. All students are entitled to the use of the College Library for which a fee of fifty cents per term is charged to each, and from this fund additions are constantly being made to the library.

## CABINETS.

The Geological, Mineralogical and Zoological Cabinets contain a valuable collection of rare and beautiful specimens, illustrative of the various departments of Natural Science. The friends of the College are invited to send to these Cabinets such specimens as may add to their completeness and value.

## APPARATUS.

The Chemical, Philosophical and Electrical Apparatus is of the most approved construction, and together with the charts and diagrams affords the means for a wide range of experimental illustration. The Laboratory is well supplied with the necessary chemicals and appliances. A Compound Microscope of the finest quality has been purchased and forms an acquisition of the highest value, especially in the studies of Botany and Zoology.

There is a fine Telescope, a Transit instrument, an Astronomical Clock, &c., for the department of Astronomy; we have also all the needful instruments for field exercises in surveying.

## SOCIETIES.

The Aletheon and the Atticæum are the only Literary Societies authorized by the College among the gentlemen, but they furnish ample facilities for improvement in composition, public speaking and parliamentary usage. Each Society has its own room and library, and is permitted one public exercise each term in the College Hall.

The Adelphean is an interesting and successful Literary Society, sustained by the ladies of the College.

Students of the College are not allowed to be acting members of literary societies not connected with the College.

## READING ROOM.

The College, in connection with the Literary Societies, has opened a Reading Room, liberally supplied with the best periodicals, both foreign and American. This is at all times accessible to College students who faithfully observe its rules.

## VACATIONS.

Vacations are three in number. The first from Commencement—eight weeks. The second from the close of the Fall Term—two weeks. The third from the close of the Winter Term—two weeks.

## LOCATION.

The village of Lima is very healthy and easy of access, and with few temptations to vice. It may be reached by the New York Central Rail Road via Honeoye Falls, four miles distant; or by the Erie Rail Road via Avon Springs, seven miles distant. Stages are in waiting at the above stations on the arrival of most of the trains.

Classes commencing Latin will be formed *only* in the Fall and Winter

## Graduating Course for Ladies.

The Graduating Course of the Seminary is designed to occupy three years, according to the following scheme.

Ladies entering upon this course of study are required to be thoroughly acquainted with Geography, (McNally or Cornell,) Arithmetic, (Robinson's High School,) Elementary Algebra entire, (Robinson,) and English Grammar and Analysis, (Clark and Bates.)

Students from other Schools are received to advanced standing on passing a satisfactory examination in the previous studies of the course, or their equivalents; *provided* they shall spend at least two terms immediately prior to graduation at this Institution.

For either French or German, may be substituted Latin, as pursued in the first three terms of the Preparatory Collegiate Course. The course in French and German has been extended, and commencing classes are formed only in the Fall Term. Those completing the course receive the honors of the School in the form of a beautiful Diploma.

## Department of Music.

## Commercial Department.

This Institution now, affords its students, in addition to all the facilities for a Classical and Philosophical education, unsurpassed advantages for the acquisition of a thorough and practical knowledge of *Business* in all its forms.

The Department has this *advantage* over Commercial Colleges :

The student has access to all other departments, and the studies taught in them, and shares in all the educational and religious privileges of the Seminary.

### COMMERCIAL COLLEGE COURSE.

At an expense of \$20, the student receives a Scholarship entitling the holder to a full course of instruction in this Department, time unlimited—involving **BOOK-KEEPING**, as applied to Commission, Partnership, Jobbing, Importing, Exporting, and Wholesale and Retail Business of all kinds; also, **PENMANSHIP**, *plain and ornamental*.

The system of writing adopted is the Spencerian,—this style being best adapted to purposes of business and correspondence.

The commercial student is thoroughly disciplined in both the Theory and Practice of Business and Accounts, and is prepared when he receives his Diploma to enter immediately upon the duties of the practical accountant.

Time required to complete the course, from three to five months, according to the attainments and capacity of the student.

## Teachers' Department.

This Department is designed to fit young ladies and gentlemen expressly and thoroughly for the work of teaching common and other Schools. It is under the supervision of a single Professor, who has all the facilities necessary for a thorough accomplishment of this important object. Its labors are performed by recitations and lectures on all the topics, theoretical and practical, necessary to a mastery of this profession. The department has hitherto been abundantly successful, having sent forth more School Teachers than any other institution in the country.

### CABINET.

The Cabinet of mineralogical and geological specimens embraces an ample collection of rocks, soils, &c., &c., including a full suit received from the State, and it is deemed quite equal to the wants of the students pursuing these branches.

Students of the Seminary also have access at stated times, to the extensive Cabinet of Natural History in Genesee College.

### LIBRARIES.

The Libraries belonging to the Institution contain about 3,500 volumes. Students can have access to the Seminary Library by paying a small sum per Term.

### SOCIETIES.

AMPHICTYON, GENESEE LYCEUM, LADIES' LITERARY SOCIETY.— They have each a Library, and an appropriately furnished room.

No person is allowed to be an acting member of these Societies, who is not at the same time an actual member of the Seminary.

Connected with the Amphictyon Association and Genesee Lyceum, is a Union Reading Room furnished with various Journals and Reviews, accessible to the students by the payment of a small fee each Term.

The Philharmonic Society, though not connected with any of the regular Departments of the Institutions, is now fully established with over one hundred performing members. Its object is “the cultivation of music, sacred and secular, for mutual pleasure and improvement,” and affords an excellent opportunity, for those who can render plain Church music readily, to keep in vocal practice. The Society now has a Musical Library of nearly 350 volumes.

### NOTE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS.

It is earnestly advised that all moneys for the use of such students as are minors, be deposited with some officer of the Seminary; and that no expenditure be allowed except under the direction of such officer. Parents who understand the importance of this advice, will not neglect it. *The Officers will not feel responsible for evil habits acquired by younger students, in consequence of a neglect to heed this suggestion.*

### MERIT ROLL.

A regular account of the daily recitations will be kept by each Teacher, exhibiting the standing and scholarship of each student during the Term.

Students furnish their own lights, pails, wash-bowls, mirrors, sheets and pillow cases, and ladies their own counterpanes. Ladies will be charged \$1,25 per term for sawing and carrying wood to their rooms.

Tuition will be charged from the time of entrance to the close of the term; and no deduction will be made except in cases of previous agreement, or continued sickness. No deduction is made for those who enter within two weeks of the commencement of the term.

The Boarding Hall is under the direction of the Steward, who is employed by the Trustees, and has no pecuniary interest in the profits and losses of the establishment.



Parents may therefore rest assured that good board will be furnished for their children, and that every necessary attention will be given them in case of sickness.

Communications on the subject of Scholarships, should be addressed to Rev. BENJAMIN SHIPMAN, Treasurer of Genesee College; on the subject of Board, &c., to DAVID HALE, Esq., Steward; and on other matters to the Principal.

Payment for Board and Tuition must be arranged in advance. But in case a Student is obliged to leave the Institution on account of sickness, his money will be refunded.

None will be considered members of the Institution until they have arranged their tuition with the Treasurer, and registered their names, ages, and places of residence, with the Principal or Preceptress.

Damages to the building and furniture are charged to those who commit them, or to the occupant of the room.

## By-Laws.

1. Students shall arise in the morning at the ringing of the bell, and sweep and arrange their rooms.
2. No student shall be unnecessarily absent from his room, leave the Seminary yard, or visit the room of a fellow student during the hours of study, without permission or order from one of the officers.
3. The student shall punctually perform the duties enjoined by the officers, diligently employ the hours of study, and, on being notified by the bell, or otherwise, to attend recitation, lecture, or other exercise, shall repair without delay to the rooms appointed.
4. There shall be at the end of every Term a public examination, which every student connected with the school is required to attend.
5. As a precaution against fire, every student shall have his pail filled with water before retiring for the night.
6. During the hours of recess, no student shall indulge in hallooing, loud talking, running, jumping, whistling, or making other disturbances in the rooms or halls of the Seminary.
7. No student shall, in any way, injure the Seminary building, or anything connected with the Institution.
8. No student shall throw ashes, dirt, or other filthy materials, from the windows of the building.
9. All students are required to cherish a respectful deference for the authority of the Faculty; and in all their social intercourse and relations, to preserve a correct and becoming deportment.
10. Any student refusing to give information in reference to another student, when required by the Faculty, shall be liable to such punishment as they may judge proper.
11. Playing at games of chance in the Seminary, or elsewhere, is totally forbidden. Also, the use of gun powder and fire arms on the premises.
12. No student shall leave town, or absent himself from his room over night, or go abroad to spend the Sabbath with his friends or others, without special permission.
13. No student shall go into the kitchen or bake-room, unless he may be in the immediate employ of the Steward, nor shall he go into the wash-room except at stated times, to convey and receive his clothing.
14. At the ringing of the bell for meals, those students boarding in the Institution shall assemble without confusion or disorder, in the dining hall, and take such seats as are assigned them, which they shall occupy until a change be directed.

15. No student shall speak, make a noise, or meddle with any article on the table, until the religious services of the table are performed. Perfect propriety and decorum must be observed by every student while at the table. No one shall retire until the table is duly dismissed, after which the students shall leave the room in good order.

16. No student shall visit taverns, groceries, or other public places, for purposes of pleasure or entertainment—nor use spiritous liquors or tobacco in any form in the Seminary buildings—nor employ immodest or profane language of any description.

17. A strict observance of the Christian Sabbath will be required of all students, and on no account will unnecessary noise be allowed—nor may students go abroad into the fields, or frequent the village, or collect at each other's rooms, without express permission. Sobriety and decorum must be observed throughout the day, and attendance at Church in the morning at such place as their parents or guardians may direct, and at the College Chapel in the afternoon, will be expected of all the students.

18. No student shall, without express permission, receive instruction in any branch of study from persons not employed by the Board of Trustees.

19. The Faculty may have access at all times to the rooms of the students.

20. No student shall make any fire in his stove after half past nine o'clock in the evening, and every one shall retire by ten.

## Female Department.

1. Ladies and Gentlemen are not allowed to associate together, in walking, riding, or otherwise, except by permission.

2. No male student is permitted to visit or enter that part of the building assigned exclusively to the females, except those in the immediate employment of the Steward.

3. If any male student has a relative in the female department whom he wishes to see, he will be permitted to go to the Steward's room, request her to be sent for, and there converse with her.

4. Female students shall be under the same restrictions as the males with regard to the above regulations. In case of confinement by sickness, however, permission is given to visit each other in their rooms.

## Location, &c.

This Institution is located in the most healthy and beautiful portion of Western New York, in the midst of one of the most productive and thriving farming regions of the State. It is easy of access, being only eighteen miles from Rochester, with which it is connected by a good road, and only four miles from the New York Central Railroad, Honeoye Falls Station. It is also within seven miles of the Buffalo and Corning and Genesee Valley branch of the Erie Railroads, Avon Springs Station. We thus enjoy the advantage of Railroads, without the disadvantages, which they would occasion to a school like ours, if passing through the place.

While the institution is decidedly unsectarian, the utmost attention will be paid to the moral and religious welfare of the students. We are happy to record, with gratitude, that these exertions have, with the blessing of God, been highly successful.

It is very desirable that students should be here to enter classes at the beginning of the term; otherwise they will find themselves so far behind as greatly to embarrass them.
